Emergency Shelter (ES): Increase of 24 HH & 29 PERSONS

Changes in the 2017 to 2018 Shelter Population totals can be attributed to several factors.  
-After careful review, two (2) TH programs included in the 2017 Point in Time and Housing Inventory Counts were excluded in the 2018 submission, as the programs did not meet the threshold requirements for inclusion: primary intent to serve homeless persons, verification of homelessness at eligibility determination, or a majority enrollment of homeless persons. Last year, these projects (Wilmer Hall and Mary's Shelter) accounted for 31 sheltered persons.  
-Also believed to be impactful in consideration of TH vs. ES numbers is a robust suite of rapid rehousing programs, including Supportive Services for Veteran Families, Family and Youth Services, & Re-entry focused programs. Households for whom a less intensive intervention is required are targeted for RRH, allowing for the availability of TH beds for those with more intensive service needs.  
-The Coordinated Entry system has well developed relationships with local Emergency Shelters (ES), and routinely assist in linking clients with ES while working towards permanent housing. Coordinated Entry case managers and services staff work with clients who have formerly been averse to utilizing shelter, encouraging consideration as a means of harm reduction and improvement in the continuity of the Coordinated Entry and service delivery process. These partnerships, and the CoC's commitment through the Coordinated Entry to assisting clients to obtain immediate shelter, is believed to have had an impact on utilization.

**Unsheltered Count Decrease of 55 Persons & 45 Households**

-As referenced in the previous note regarding changes to the Sheltered Count, the 2018 Count showed a higher utilization of Emergency Shelter (ES) services, which is understood to be related to the reduction in unsheltered persons.

-The AL501 CoC is committed to prioritizing chronically homeless persons and unsheltered persons/families through the Coordinated Entry. As such, these households are targeted for referral to supportive services and assistance, including the RRH programs as referenced in the previous note as well as Permanent Supportive Housing programs.

-Development projects throughout the past year, primarily in formerly wooded areas in the outer limits of the city/ county, resulted in the disbanding of several well established encampments. In year\'s past, these camps and the surrounding areas have yielded counts of unsheltered persons in excess of this year\'s in the same areas. It is yet unknown the extent to which these persons continue to reside in the CoC, can be attributed to the increase in ES utilization, and/ or have relocated outside the CoC\'s geographic area.
